Annual Meeting Minutes . . .

Cypress Historical Society, Annual Meeting Minutes

November 15, 2008 1:00 p.m.

President Diane Neff called the first annual meeting of the Cypress Historical Society to order at 1:10 p.m. She thanked everyone present for coming and gave a brief description of when the Society was formed and its purpose for being formed. She asked everyone to please sign in before they left if they had not already done so. She advised we needed volunteers to help on the accounting, newsletter, fund raising, website, educational programs, and social activities committees and encouraged those able to assist in any area to sign the list available on the table. She advised everyone there were some paper copies of the bylaws available and also a list to sign if they preferred to receive them by email. If anyone joins the Society today, they will get a membership for 14 months which is through the end of 2009. Everyone else who has already joined will be asked to renew their membership in January 2009.

A membership report was given by Secretary Helen Callender: Individual -25, Family (44) - 88, Sustaining -9, Sponsor -3, Business -1, and Corporate Sponsor -1; Total = 127.

Copies of the treasurer's report were available for everyone and Treasurer Jim Sigmund explained it. A copy is attached to these minutes. He advised the current balance was \$3,022.90 with a couple of pending expenses yet to be paid.

Diane Neff introduced Fred Collins, Cypress Historic Park Director, as the guest speaker. Fred's presentation was regarding the significance of Cypress in Northwest Harris County and how it played an important part in the early days as a communication hub and a transportation hub. He explained how the journals left in the Juergen's store provided a good history of what life was like in Cypress in the 1850's and later.

Jane Ledbetter, Historian, then gave a report on the research that had been done thus far to recreate the history of the Cypress area and life as it once was. The original focus has been on journals and abstracts to learn about life in Cypress. As history is being compiled, it is being put on the computer with the hope of having a website for future generations to reference and learn about the early life and times of Cypress residents. Family trees were being compiled of the early families and will be displayed in Juergen's Hall. This genealogy work, along with other research is a work in progress and there are still some family trees being researched and developed. As with any project, there has to be a starting point and the CHS historians have done the best they could in starting with the original settlers. In some cases, this caused them to condense some family trees because of the large numbers of individuals involved and the limited space allowed for the displays. She thanked everyone who had provided pictures or information. Jane asked if anyone had any old pictures of the Cypress area to contact the historians.

Another area the historians are working on is documentation of old houses in the area. A Book of Memories of the Cypress area is also being compiled and she welcomed anyone with information or contributions to contact her. She solicited volunteers to help with research. Diane Neff announced the Cypress Historical Society would have a meeting in the first quarter of 2009 and would have a presentation on the history of Cypress.

Currently, the Cypress Historical Society meets at Kleb Woods but will be looking for a meeting place closer to Cypress Top Park.

It was announced the Cypress Top Historic Park would be open on Tuesdays from 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. for anyone wishing to tour the facilities.

The business meeting adjourned and all those in attendance were encouraged to tour the buildings in the park and return to Juergen's Hall for refreshments and to share past stories and memories.

Memories of Cypress . . .

Living with Grandma Juergen

My mother (Lilia Juergen Zaboroski), my brother, Gene, and I lived with Grandma Juergen after my mother and dad divorced. I was five, and Gene was three years of age (making this around the year of 1939). We had a room on the west end of the Juergen house. It was furnished with two iron bedsteads and a chifforobe.

Other members of the family lived in Grandma's home with us: Uncle Eddie, Uncle Clarence, and cousin Meta Hegar and her son, Douglas. I have often thought back on Grandma having to care for all of us after raising her own large family. She cooked our meals, sometimes with help from our mother and Meta, but basically she was responsible for running the household. She was a guiet person who simply took care of everything that fell her lot to take care of.

There was no air conditioning back then, but we really didn't need it. That house had lots of big windows, which we opened wide and let the breeze come in. Being so close to the railroad you might think we couldn't sleep when the trains came rumbling by during the night right across the two-lane highway from the house. But we usually slept soundly through the night without being awakened.

While we lived there with Grandma, my mother worked at Hot Wells. She walked along the railroad tracks to get there. She boarded there at Hot Wells and would walk back home to Grandma Juergen's house to visit with us on her days off.

My mother was paid the grand sum of \$1.00/day for her work at Hot Wells. One of her jobs there was to rent bathing suits to whoever needed one (not everybody had his or her own bathing suit back then). She also showed people where to change clothes and where to put their own clothes while they were in the pool.

Some people probably thought Gene and I could eat all the candy we ever wanted, and drink all the soda pop we wanted since we

were in and out of the store all the time. But such was not the case. We did not get to have those things unless we had the money to pay for them, and usually we did not have any money. However, sometimes if we looked sad enough, somebody at the bar would feel sorry for us and give us a nickel or a dime to buy some candy or a soda pop.

I guess it could be said that Gene and I had a typical brother-sister relationship. He loved to chase me around and around Grandma's big dining room table threatening to hit me with a piece of firewood. Of course, I ran and screamed because I really did not know what he might do if he ever caught me. His other thing was to jump out of the hedge between the house and the store and scare me as I walked by there going to and from the store.

Gene and I spent a great deal of our growing-up years in the Juergen house. I feel that we were very fortunate to grow up there, in the little country town of Cypress, surrounded by family and friends. I know Gene feels the same way.
