Currently we have worked with Joyce Moore in researching her mother's family who were railroad people in the Satsuma area. Much to our delight, she has provided about 350 pictures of the Smith/Schuenmann family for us to copy.

Another subject is the House family, who go back to the early Spanish land grants and were some of the earliest settlers of the Republic of Texas. Calvin House has met with us, and supplied pictures and information from his known family history. We were able to find early Republic records, land grants, and census copies, which greatly added to Calvin's family tree, including another earlier generation!

Jane Ledbetter has been researching the early ranches and dairies west of Cypress Top. If anyone has pictures or news articles on the Nine Bar Ranch of Cypress, please share them with us. There is still a lot of area history to uncover, and we appreciate any information.

Jim Sigmund and Trevia Wooster Beverly have been working on our Application for a Texas Historic Landmark Marker for Cypress Top.

The Rest of the Story . . .

In the November, 2010 issue of the Newsletter, we ran a picture of the old Satsuma Railroad Section House. The house is still standing today (barely!). Imagine our delight when CHS member Joyce (Schuenmann) Moore called us to say she knew who had lived in that house! Indeed, Joyce's mother, Naomi (Smith) Schuenmann, born in Heights Hospital in 1916, came home to that house and lived there until she was sixteen years old.

Naomi's mother died when Naomi was born; fortunately, Grace Smith was living with the family as a "family helper" and took on the task of caring for the newborn infant as well as Naomi's four sisters. A neighboring family also cared for Naomi some of the time with the idea of adopting her, but her father did not want that to happen. He ended up marrying the Grace; they then had three children of their own, making a total of eight children in the family.

One of the little boys in the family liked to play with matches, and one day the inevitable happened: the house caught fire and burned. The family moved into an old barn behind the house (it only had a dirt floor) where they lived until the house could be rebuilt.

Naomi's father died when she was sixteen years old; by that time one of her sisters had married and lived in Cypress across from the original St. John Lutheran Church. Naomi came to live with this sister and her husband. She attended worship services at St. John Church, as did the Schuenmann family who lived on Mueschke Road. In due time, Naomi became acquainted with Albert Schuenmann, a romance developed and they married. They built their home on Schuenmann property and raised their two daughters, Carolyn and Joyce, there. Joyce and her late husband built their home in the same area on Mueschke Road, where Joyce still lives today. Her son lives nearby.




Joyce Moore's parents: Naomi (Smith) and Albert Schuenmann.

Memories of Cypress...

The Southern Pacific Railroad ran along side Hwy 290 in the old days. The tracks were maintained by work crews living along side the tracks in what was called Section Houses. There was one at Fairbanks and one at Cypress. It was about 1 ¼ mile west from Cypress (at Mueschke Road). That was called Section House #4. There were six houses there. My father, Melecio Rivera, was the Foreman. Five other houses were there also, where the other workers and their families lived.

There was a big pond across the RR tracks, across 290 Hwy. The pond was big, about 200' long, and 10-12 feet deep. We used to swim and fish in it.



Comparison of the 1930 air photo to the same area on the 1915 topo map.




Robert Rivera, at 15 years old, in 1951. This picture was taken in back of the Cypress Section House.

The crew at the #4 Section House in Cypress were:

Foreman Melecio Rivera – 2 sons Pete Tipia – 2 sons Jose Alamanza – 5 children James Banks – 4 children Orleans Ayers – 3 children Jefferson – 3 children

Only the Forman's house had indoor water. All the others had to get water from a single faucet in the middle of the yard, and carry it indoors. All bathrooms, of course, were outside.

Memories of My Father

In the year of 1894, the 11th month, the 11 day our father Jose Martin Alamanza was born to Benito Alamanza and Tomesa Rodriquez in Zuronuato, Mexico

At the age of 19 years our father entered the United States by swimming the river coming from Michocan. Daddy started working for the railroad in Calvert, Texas where the railroad house section was. His foreman was Alfredo Begas until he was transferred to Cypress, Texas. In November 2, 1935 our daddy married Luz Rodriquez, daughter of Refugia and Ramon Rodriquez who came to the United States from San Luis Potosio.

In 9-10-1942, Daddy was employed by Southern Pacific RR. His foreman was J. Gray.

In 11-18-1947 his foreman was C. O. Powell in Cypress, TX.

In 11-28-1947 his foreman was F. C. Hooper in Ennis, TX.

In 1954 his foreman was Melecio Rivera in Cypress, TX.

In 6-24-1958 his foreman was C. O. Powell in Cypress, TX.


Daddy and Mother had five children who are John Alamanza, Margaret (Martinez), Carmen (Martin), Mary (Vargas), and Tommie (Barrera) who, thanks to God, are still living. In Cypress, Texas, we were given

houses to live in. Our neighbors were Mr. Rivera and family, Mr. Tapia and family, Mr. James Banks, and Mr. Orleans Ayus and family.

My mother, brother, and sisters worked in our garden and took care of horses, cows, chickens, pigs, ducks, rabbits, and dogs. We would cut wood for our stove while our father worked out of town. Mother and the girls sewed our clothes and canned food that we grew in our garden. The Waltons had nothing on us!

In 10-30-1958 Daddy retired from working with Southern Pacific. On September 24, 1974 we lost our father at the age of 80.

To the right is a picture of our father sitting under his apple tree. The round flower bed he is sitting in is our Mother's flower bed. Our Mother took great pride in her flower bed.
