New Clue for Juergen's Store History

Recently the Director of Cypress Top Historic Park, Fred Collins, received a call from a man who knew of Cypress Top Historic Park and the Juergen name associated with it. He asked if we had any Juergen's Store tokens. Well, none of us associated with Cypress Top even knew there had ever been such a thing. The man said one had been advertised on E-bay and sent Mr. Collins the

page with the information and pictures of the token. The token pictured here is brass, not dated, and is 0.95 x 0.95 inches square. Internet searches found possible token dates of 1902, 1906 and 1908. How Mr. Juergen obtained the tokens or how they were dispensed to his customers is unknown.

Mr. Collins is challenging CHS members to find a specimen or two for the park collection. If your family lived in the Cypress area, you might look through family memorabilia for tokens or other items tied to Cypress history. If you frequent antique shops, you might also check there. Contact any CHS board member if you find something of interest. Happy hunting!

The Empty Chair

Sitting in the bar area of Juergen's Store in Cypress Top Historic Park is a rather forlorn-looking old chair. Lillian (Lund) Juergen, wife of store proprietor Clarence Juergen, sat in the chair almost daily for many years as she watched customers come and go in the store and bar, getting up to take care of their needs as necessary, but always returning to her chair. Here she worked crossword puzzles as she kept her vigil.

Lillian Lucille Lund was born in San Antonio, Texas, but later relocated to the "West End" in Houston. One of her first jobs was working at the counter in a dry cleaners. For recreation she enjoyed going to weekend dances at the Sons of Herman Hall or Bill Mraz Hall in Houston. It is believed that she met Clarence Juergen at one of these dances. A romance blossomed, and



they married April 12, 1941. The newlyweds moved into the apartment above Juergen's Store; the apartment and the store became Miss Lillian's focal point for the rest of her life, which ended August 18, 1997. Some of her shoes and clothes are still in the apartment today.

Lillian was a petite little lady who wore high heeled shoes and pretty dresses with a fur cape for dress-up occasions. Her niece, Joyce Kleb, remembers as a young girl going up to the apartment and playing "dress up" with Aunt Lillian's clothes and shoes. (It is interesting that Lillian herself did not go shopping very often; Clarence, who went into Houston frequently on business, would many times bring home a new outfit for Lillian. Remarkably, the clothes he selected fit Lillian perfectly almost every time!) Gene Zaboroski's daughters also remember dressing up in Aunt Lillian's clothes; Aunt Lillian also let them bake cookies in her apartment. Since Lillian and Clarence had no children of their own, it was Lillian's pleasure to indulge her niece and great-nieces.

Today, the empty chair continues to keep vigil in the store as Miss Lillian did for so many years.



The Legend Lives On

On February 25, a number of CHS members were among those boarding a Harris County Bus at Cypress Top for a trip to the Texas Ranger Hall of Fame and Museum in Waco. The museum is dedicated to the history and lore of the oldest state law enforcement agency in the nation, the legendary Texas Rangers. Founded in 1823, the Rangers are known even today for their prowess as crime-fighters.

The Museum visit began with a film about the Texas Rangers, followed by a guided tour. Of particular interest during the tour was the opportunity to actually pick up and handle a Walker-Colt pistol, the kind used by the Rangers. Those were really heavy weapons; it took a strong man to handle one.
