

# **EDUCATION... Another First for CHS**

The Texas Environmental Education Advisory Council (TEEAC) has approved our initial proposal for becoming a provider of teacher training. This will allow us to offer teacher workshops at the Cypress Historical Society building or at individual schools. Each workshop offered must include a detailed program description including competencies, workshop activities, and evaluation. The workshops will be designed around the Texas Essential Knowledge Skills (TEKS). This is a big step in providing professional development for area teachers. Jay Gavitt will be attending the annual TEEAC workshop in Austin. A special thanks to the staff at Kleb Woods for getting us started on this process.

We have also started distributing a CHS produced "Educational Resources for Teachers and Youth Leaders". This CD includes materials and activities designed to help young people explore local history and geography. Teachers are able to individualize these materials for use with their students. The disk contains Powerpoint files on "Examining artifacts" and "Clothing"; teacher readings on local history, along with copies of photographs that can be used with students. These have been distributed to 3<sup>rd</sup> grade teachers at Fiest Elementary School and 7<sup>th</sup> grade teachers at Salyards Middle School. These have also been distributed to a couple of local scouting groups.

### **Growing Up in Fairbanks**

My father's family came to America in 1851 from Germany and settled in Industry, Austin County, Texas. My grandfather, William August Sommermeyer was the first Texas-born in the family. My father Willard Alvin Sommermeyer, born 1912, was the second generation born in Texas.

His parents, Lydia and William Sommermeyer moved to Fairbanks, Texas in 1920. They bought a dairy farm, about 100 acres, just south of Hwy 290. They had 7 children, my father being the oldest. He went to work on a neighboring dairy farm owned by the Fischer Family. He was only 12 years of age. He worked for the Fischers until he was 18 years old when he lost his right leg in a farming accident. He recovered and went on to work at his father's shop: Fairbanks Mop and Broom.

Willard married my mother, Robbie Palmore in 1937 in Houston. With a young family he knew they would need a home of their own. He heard that Warren Petroleum Fields was clearing land for their camp just off Wirt Road (now Windfern Road).

So my father went to talk to the camp foreman. He asked what they were going to do with the trees that had been cut down. The camp foreman said that they were going to burn them. He asked if he could have the trees and the camp foreman said, "Take all you want."

So my father went to a friend and neighbor, Mr. B.F. Adams, who owned a saw mill in Fairbanks. He hoped to see if they could work out a deal. Mr. Adams said he would cut one for one, (meaning one tree for you and one for me). My father called on family & friends to help to gather the logs and take them to the mill.

In 1940, he started to plan the house he was going to build. During this time, WWII started and many of the men went into the service. My dad was not able to serve, so he went to work at the ship yard to help the cause. Working all week, he didn't have much time to build on the house. It took longer than he planned, but by 1944 the family moved in.

The house was ultimately a little two story house. At first, there was only the bottom floor. There was a kitchen, dining room, living room, a bedroom for my parents, a limited bathroom, and a sunroom for all of the kids. We took our baths in a big washtub in the kitchen. Daddy built shelves all around the top of the kitchen for all the jars of canned goods from the garden. We had a wood stove for the first years in the house.

My mother had the most beautiful garden in the front yard. She started all of her flowers from seeds she ordered or seeds from friends' plants. In her garden, she would have snap dragons, zinnia, daisies, bachelor buttons, and more.

In 1946, the youngest of 4 children was born. We lived across the pecan orchard from my grandparents. The pecan orchard was planted in 1920. It was a great place to play as a child. My mother could see us from one side of the orchard, and our grandmother could see us from the other side. We spent time playing games like red rover, tag & baseball. In the evening, after supper, we would go outside.

Mother would bring a quilt for us to play on as she and Dad would talk about the day.

On Sunday morning, we would go to Fairbanks Methodist Church. It was about a half mile from our house. We could hear the church bell ringing at home for the call to worship. My sisters and brother were 9, 7 and 5 years older than I. Weather permitting, we would walk to church. If we heard the bell ringing on the way, we would run so we would not be late.

On Christmas Eve, we would all walk across the orchard to my grandparents' house. All the cousins would come. My grandmother would play Christmas carols on the piano and sing "O Tannenbaum" in German. Each of the children would receive a brown bag with pecans, apples, oranges, and peppermint sticks.
