SPRING CREEK COUNTY IN EARLY TEXAS, MOST CITIZEN INTERACTIONS WITH GOVERNMENT TOOK PLACE AT THE COUNTY SEAT, SO SMALLER COUNTIES WERE MORE CONTENIENT FOR THE RESIDENTS. PRIOR TO 1841, EACH COUNT HAD AT LEAST ONE CONGRESSMAN, BUT SINCE THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS CONSTITUTION LIMITED CONGRESS TO 40 MEMBERS, SPRING CREEK AND IS OTHER NEW COUNTIES BECAME "JUDICIAL" COUNTIES FROVIDING ALL COURT AND GOVERNMENT SERVICES. CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICTS. HOWEVER, REMAINED UNICHANGED, SO SOME CONGRESSMEN NOW REPRESENTED MULTIPLE COUNTIES. ON JANUARY 21, 1841, AT THE REQUEST OF 130 MALE RESIDENTS OF HARRIS AND MONTGOMERY COUNTIES, CONGRESS CREATED SPRING CREEK COUNTY, EXTENDING FROM THE HEAD OF SPRING CREEK NEAR WALLER TO ITS MOUTH NEAR HUMBLE. AND FROM LAKE CREEK IN THE NORTH TO JUST SOUTH OF CYPRESS TOP. THE COUNTY SEAT WAS TO BE A NEAR TODAY'S ROSE HILL. GEORGE W. CROPPER, ISAAC DECKER, WILLIAM PIERPONT, ABRAM, ROBERTS AND ARCHIBALD SMITH WERE NAMED COUNTY COMMISSIONERS, AND JAMES COOPER WAS APPOINTED CHIEF JUSTICE (COUNTY JUDGE), ON MAY 8, 1841 THE FOLLOWING WERE ELECTED. DISTRICT CLERK WILLIAM B. REVEYS, COUNTY CLERK THOMAS M. HOGGON, SHERIFF ALEXANDER F. BARRON, CORONER JASON WHITNEY, SURVEYOR EUGENE PILLOT, AND JUSTICES OF THE PRACE NATHANIEL H. CARRON, SAMUEL DAYS, JAMES DICKSON, HENRY T. MOSTYN, CLAUDE N. PILLOT, AND JOHN SIMMONS. SINCE EACH COUNTY DID NOT HAYE ITS OWN CONGRESSMAN, THE REPUBLIC OF TEXAS SUPREME COUNT GENER COUNTY IS THE ONLY ONE WHOSE TERRITORY REMAINS ALMOST ENTIRELY WITHIN ITS PARENT COUNTIES.

New Spring Creek County Marker

On November 17, 2015, northwest Harris County dedicated a new Historical Marker in Spring Creek Park in Tomball. You may have heard of the Spring Creek County Heritage Museum in Tomball, and wondered why it had that name. Research by Trevia Wooster Beverly and Bernice Mistrot of the Harris County Historic Commission detailed the proposed "Judicial County" of 1842, which was not approved. The proposed county seat of Greenville would have been just east of the Hirsch property in Rosehill.


As this year's guest speaker, I presented my ongoing research on the "Early History of Hot Wells", from the drilling of the first well in 1902 up to the early 1950s. Unique documents from the Precinct 3 Cypress Top Collection, along with internet sources and old newspaper clippings, allowed us to put together the fascinating history of this Cypress landmark. But the real treat was the sharing of memories of those that grew up swimming at Hot Wells. Bob Rivera, Charles Stansell, and Bob MacDonald worked at Hot Wells, and lived in the hotel during the summer. Their lively stories kept the group in stitches! NW Library Hosts CHS: "Cypress at the Turn of the Century (1895-1915)"

In conjunction with the "Gulf Coast Reads" program, Jim Sigmund presented a talk on "Cypress at The Turn of the Century" at the NW Harris County Library (near Jones Rd and Grant Rd) on October 31st. A crowd of close to 40 people attended!

The 2015 selection for Gulf Coast Reads program was "The Promise" by Sugarland author Ann Weisgarber. The historical fiction book tells of a young woman who comes from Ohio to marry a dairy farmer on the west end of Galveston Island . . . just two weeks before the devastating 1900 Hurricane! Ann spoke about the research and inspiration for her book at the Cy-Fair College Wednesday Library program on October 7th. While much is known about the devastation in the city of Galveston, Ann wanted to tell the story of the rural families. CHS provided a display board for Ann's talk documenting the effects of the 1900 Hurricane on Northwest Harris County.



- New member Don Morris is working on his family genealogy. His GG Grandfather, Joseph W. Baker owned a 2000 acre ranch south of Spring-Cypress purchased in the late 1800's (area around the Post Office, Dry Creek, and Coles Crossing). We tried to see if he was related to William R. Baker, who brought the railroad to Cypress, but we could not make the connection (yet!). Don has family deeds and documents throughout the Houston area, even an original letter from Sam Houston to the Allen Brothers!
- Gene Zaboroski came by to donate an old cane fishing pole, a vintage Coca-Cola bottle opener and the checkbook register from the Cypress Lawn & Storage business.
- Beverly Richardson and I were invited to the Rose
 Hill Methodist Church to meet with their historian,
 Judith. She loaned us several scrapbooks and
 photos of their Church's history, which we scanned
 and returned. So many of our historic buildings
 either burned, were blown over, or were rebuilt.
 Built in 1888, their old sanctuary still stands todays
 and is used for services. Rose Hill Methodist is also
 selling our calendars from the main office in the new
 church.
- At our Annual Meeting on Oct 17th, Bob Rivera brought us more great pictures of Hot Wells and made sketch drawings of several of the buildings. Celeste Haltom found a picture in her family album which was posed in front of the well house/water tower at Hot Wells.

Adam Collection coming to CHS

Last month, David Jaeger visited with members of the Cypress Historical Society and learned about our extensive collection of local Cypress and Fairbanks family histories. David described the collection that he had dating from his grandfather, Otto Adam. Otto came from Germany and later moved to Cypress where he started a farm. In 1908, he moved to Fairbanks where he opened a store on Hempstead Highway in the center of Fairbanks. He ran the post office and served on the school board. Otto was also a trustee of St. John Lutheran Church. David Jaeger, Otto's grandson shared a part of the collection with the Society. These contained family photographs, albums and a post card collection. While some of the photographs could not be repaired, most were able to be digitalized for David. The Adam Collection, which contains 178 photographs and over eighty post cards, can be viewed at the Darline Roth Research Library at the Cypress Historical Society. We are hoping that David will be able to share additional photographs in his extensive collection with us.
