180 Years Ago

On the morning of April 16, 1836, Sam Houston, the Texian Army, and a rag-tag group of families on the Runaway Scrape, left Sam McCarley's AJ Foyt road in Hockley. They Abe Roberts's property near the Robert's Cemetery. That fateful day, the army took the south fork along the Washington-to-Harrisburg road through Cypress. After a hard day of travel across the rain-soaked Cypress prairie, they camped at Matthew Burnett's place along Cypress Creek near Telge Road. The next morning, they continued their journey to San Jacinto, to ultimately confront the Mexican Army under Santa Anna. In 1836, the Burnett settlement in Cypress was the only inhabited place between the Spring Creek settlements and Harrisburg. Visit us, and find out more about the history of Cypress as an important crossroads even before the arrival of the railroads and the German immigration!

Cy-Fair High School and the Cypress HistoricalSociety Working Togetherby Jay Gavitt

The Library/Media Center at Cy-Fair HS and the Cypress Historical Society have just completed a joint project that has made some valuable resources available for students and the public. The collections included the Scrapbooks about the community of Cypress-Fairbanks that were created by high school librarians from 1944-1988 and originally stored in the "Texas Room" at the high school. The second collection includes the Cy-Fair High School Yearbooks from 1938 to the present. The process included scanning both collections, and creating digital copies as well as hard copies. The digital copies at the high school will allow students and staff to readily access the collections for research. Digital and hard copies are now made available for the public to access at the Cypress Historical Society Darline Roth Research Library.

The project was spearheaded by Jackie Hamilton, the librarian at Cy-Fair H.S. and Beverly Richardson of the Cypress Historical Society. A number of additional staff took part in this project which included inventorying, scanning, and indexing of each annual scrapbook. After inventorying the collection of yearbooks at the high school, it was discovered the school did not have a copy of the first yearbook from 1938. The Society was able to scan an original copy from their collection and provide the high school with a copy to complete their collection of earliest yearbooks. While further researching the yearbook collection, it was noticed that no yearbooks were produced during the World War II years (1941-1944). The high school does have a display of graduating classes during those years. Copies of those pictures as well as both collections are now available to the public at the Cypress Historical Society's Darline Roth Research Library located at Cypress Top Historic Park. During their visit to Cypress Ranch High School, we were able to view a diligent and alluring presentation that discussed Cypress' Historic Hot Wells. CHS Presents at Ault Elementary School

by Jay Gavitt The Cypress Historical Society helped present the Presidents' Day Program for second grade students at Ault Elementary School in Fairfield. The program was set up by School Librarian Courtney Kater and CHS's Jay Gavitt. The program focused on the lives of George Washington and Abraham Lincoln, and began with a picture book reading about the lives of each President. A total of eight classes of students attended during the day. In addition to the readings, the students were asked a number of thought-provoking questions. During the final section of each presentation, the students viewed models of a Valley Forge cabin and an Illinois log cabin. The model of Lincoln's birthplace was created by Ault 5th grader, Chris Fonte. Each of the 175 students was given a clothes-pin figure to attire as a Washington or Lincoln era figure for homework. The following week, the students helped create a display in the Library featuring their figures and the cabins. These figures included Washington and Lincoln, along with figures of the First Ladies, Martha Washington and Mary Lincoln. A number of students created figures of pioneers and soldiers. The program was posted on the Ault School "Twitter" page. Future programs are being prepared for other elementary school grades through the library.

- Glenn Camp recently visited CHS and noticed the large wooden tooth rake displayed. Mr. Camp explained that the rake was used in the process of threshing grain. Later he returned to show us a hand-made wooden flail. He was kind enough to give us a written description of the threshing process featuring both the flail and the wooden tooth rake. Glenn then mentioned to us that it would be a welcome companion for our wooden tooth rake and donated it to our collection. Both the flail and wooden tooth rake are now on exhibit at the Cypress Historical Society.
- Lynette Moon brought us an interesting photo of finely dressed folks celebrating in the early 1900's. Lynette believes her Grandmother is in the photo, but did not know much else. The super sleuths of the Thursday crew studied the photo to see that they were holding a plaque of the "Grand Army of The Republic", an organization of Union Civil War veterans! - Erline Schoenfeldt has loaned us her collection of The Texas Company/Texaco toy truck banks. These are in mint condition and are on display in the CHS Library.

Flails were used in the early 1800's before the steam powered threshing machine. Stalks of grain were placed in a wooden flail room in the barn. The flail was then used to beat the stalks which knocked the grain out of the heads.

 Both Jane and I had the pleasure of talking to Bill Steighan, CFHS Class of 1940, who currently lives in Midland. Bill told of time spent at Hot Wells, and especially Tin hall, where his father played dominos and his mother danced. He grew up on the family property on Hempstead and Clay Rd, and went to the first Fairbanks School. Bill and his cousin, Elaine (Ehlert) Frankin, have joined CHS.
